WHO WE ARE

Since 2003, LAPS has grown to become a leader in animal welfare.

The Langley Animal Protection Society (LAPS) is a registered non-profit charitable society established in 2003 by a dedicated group of volunteers. These volunteers were eager to see positive change in the way stray, lost and unwanted animals were sheltered and cared for in Langley. In order to uphold these founding member's values, we continue to focus on providing excellence to the community and overcoming the challenges facing animals in Langley.

Based at the Patti Dale Animal Shelter in Aldergrove, our staff and volunteers use a progressive and humane approach to care for more than 1300 dogs, cats and farm animals each year. All animals that are cared for by LAPS benefit from environmental enrichment, frequent exercise, nutritious food and top quality medical care. Our staff and volunteers ensure that each animal has the best chance at a happy and healthy life.





Our mandate is to promote the physical, emotional and psychological wellbeing of companion animals in Langley. As an organization we value integrity, excellence, courage and community in everything we do.



We are always proud of the work that LAPS does each year to help vulnerable animals and people in our community. Our organization and team of supporters did incredible work through our Major's Legacy Fund, helping to support the pets of low income and homeless members of our community. In 2019, LAPS provided a soft place to land for more than 1400 animals that needed our help. Through medical care, safe housing, and training, animals were given the time and attention they needed to either be reunited with their owners or adopted into loving homes. This year, after much planning we were able to add 2 new programs to help the community. First, the LAPS Youth in Animal Welfare program was created to provide an opportunity for a group of multi-barriered youth to gain work experience in the animal welfare industry. Second, LAPS implemented a new volunteer run, humane education program for elementary classrooms. It is incredible to see the impact animals have on our lives, especially our youth.

The new LAPS Cat Intake and Isolation Facility operated near capacity though out 2019. This facility enabled us to provide help to so many injured and sick cats in the community like Van Gogh; an orphaned kitten who survived because of the life-saving medical care he received. LAPS answered calls for help from other communities by housing and treating sick kittens that were at risk of being euthanized due to a lack of isolation space within their own shelters. The extra capacity in our new building allowed us to grow our Trap Neuter and Return to field (TNR) program. This program provides vital help to community cats and is managed by a small team of dedicated volunteers. We were able to find homes for 91 TNR cats and kittens and prevented a whopping 1700 unwanted kittens from being born.

The work our organization does is only possible when our whole community works together to support those who are most vulnerable. Thank you to each of you who gave your time, talent or treasure – you made this possible! You are truly heroes.




Lending a Hand

On November 29 2019, horror struck the heart of Langley as an apartment building went up in flames. Residents of the building lost everything, including a place for themselves and their animals to live. LAPS Animal Control Officers were quick to the scene of the fire in order to take in as many animals as we could. We provided food, temporary housing and care for these pets until their owners were back on their feet again. All animals were returned safely to their owners within the following weeks of the fire.




Van Gogh's Story

When a litter of starving kittens came into our care, one kitten in particular was in need of immediate medical attention. Van Gogh was suffering from a traumatic injury on the left side of his head that was severely infected. In order to save his life, Van Gogh would have to undergo surgery to completely remove his ear and try to preserve what remaining tissues were left. Van Gogh was lucky enough to recover from his surgery in the loving home of one of our Kitten Foster moms. Through countless hours of care and many visits to the Vet office, Van Gogh recovered miraculously well. Without the support of our community, we would not be able to save lives like Van Gogh. Thanks to you, Van Gogh was adopted into his forever home on October 19 2019.

SAVING LIVES

Our Cat Intake and Isolation Facility is a state of the art isolation and recovery facility on the same site of the Patti Dale Animal Shelter. As a sheltering first in Canada, this facility provides much needed space for the care of sheltered cats and kittens in our community and can house up to 40 cats and kittens at a time.

3633 combined days of low stress housing for pregnant and recovering cats



567 treatments for cats & kittens infected with Upper Respiratory Diseases & Ringworm Lesions



After many years of fundraising, planning and final construction, we saw our long time dream of the ISOasis come true. Through the support of Statewood Properties LTD, we are able to keep this dream running at full capacity. This facility allows us to enhance the quality of life and reduce the time from intake to adoption, while limiting the spread of feline related diseases for cats in our care.



The Doghouse

The Doghouse is a unique partnership between LAPS and the Canadian Correctional Service (CSC). The program takes place in Abbotsford at the Fraser Valley Institution, a federal prison for women. The K-9 program is an employment training program where inmate participants learn how to handle, train and groom dogs. Through this they acquire both industry-specific and general employment skills. The program provides a therapeutic opportunity for the participants to develop friendships in a healthy and respectful environment. Upon completion of the program, participants receive the following qualifications:

Kennel Attendant Level 1 & 2
Groomer's Aid
Canine First Aid
Professional Dog Trainer Certificate

INSPIRING FURTURE GENERATIONS

With the support of the TELUS Friendly Future Community grant, December 2019 saw the start of our long anticipated Youth Employment in Animal Welfare Program. Through a series of formal classroom education sessions, work experience and job shadowing, the participating multibarrier youth earned 3 certificates, and marketable skills for careers in the animal welfare industry. During this program, participants were able to discover the value they can have in an animal's life and our community.

Our partners play a critical role in our initiatives. They help us reach more animals in need. In 2019 we strengthened existing partnerships and developed new ones. Here are just a few examples:





By maintaining a healthy diet, our animals are much more likely to maintain good health which increases their chances of finding their forever home.






