ADAPTING TO A VIRTUAL WORLD

In response to the growing concerns of the COVID-19 virus, our organization, like so many others, had to make difficult decisions to keep the community safe. For the first time in LAPS history, the shelter doors were closed to public visitors and our incredible team of volunteers. We suspended all in-person adoptions, fundraising events and social enterprise initiatives - such as the Doghouse training boarding and program. These endeavours are all very important to our shelter's success and contribute critical funding for our ongoing operations.

Though our usual way of life was undoubtedly disturbed, we knew people would need our support more than ever. The pandemic forced small organizations like ours to be creative in upholding our commitment to the community we serve. We adjusted our daily operations in accordance with public health measures and forged our way through the uncharted territory of virtual fundraising.

Despite a season of rapid cultural shift, there were many moments that reminded us what a beautiful community Langley is. LAPS, along with many other animal welfare centres saw adoption inquires for shelter animals soar. With many people working from home and with no imminent plans to travel, many people found themselves in a position to provide a shelter animal with a loving home.

Our adoption team was overwhelmed with the incredible amount of applications coming into the shelter. Adoptable animals, even ones that were more challenging to place, were finding forever homes far more quickly than we had ever seen before. At times, our adoption team would receive over 100 applications for just one single kitten. In order to keep up with high demand, our organization developed an online adoption portal to more efficiently process applications and match animals with their forever families.

On top of all of this, we were blown away by the way we saw many people come together in support of one another. Little did we know that our virtual fundraising events such as the Dreams Do Come True Virtual Gala would become our most successful gala to date.





Dreams Do Come True Virtual Gala

Life may have changed in 2020, but our mission did not. In order to reach our fundraising goals, the LAPS event committee proposed the Dreams Do Come True Virtual Gala — a Gala that would be hosted entirely from an online platform for our guests to enjoy. Even though we were not able to come together in person, this was truly a special night for everyone involved.

We put together an innovative LAPS Gala in a Box; a three-course gourmet meal kit for two, including a perfect wine pairing handpicked by KIS Consulting. This was the perfect way for our guests to enjoy a glamourous evening from the comfort of their own homes. Thanks to the support of our incredible sponsors and the many kind community members who took part in our virtual Gala, we were able to raise over \$104,000.

By providing medical care, dog food, cat food and basic care necessities, we were able to ensure that more families stayed together despite hardship.








Healthy Communities Include Healthy Pets


Major's Legacy Fund Distribution in 2020



PATTI DALE AWARD

Each year, LAPS presents the Patti Dale Award of Excellence to a stand-out volunteer. This year's recipients exemplify all the things Patti, one of the LAPS founders, for ____ compassion, stood commitment, and leadership. With so many incredible volunteers who give so much to our organization, the task of choosing just one winner is always a challenge for us. Often the nominations result in a tie; 2020 was one of those years.

Two of our long-time volunteer veterinarians, Dr. Gigi Lin and Dr. Margaret Henderson were awarded the 2021 Patti Dale Award of Excellence.

Dr. Henderson worked closely with our staff over the last year to update shelter medical protocols and to teach the animal care team how to identify ringworm funguses, saving significant resources on laboratory expenses. She is also always willing to foster exceptionally sick animals and provide them with 24-hour care until they are feeling better.

Dr. Lin volunteers weekly providing expert medical care for our shelter residents. This is incredibly important because it means that stray and injured animals receive medical treatment as soon as they arrive at the shelter. Dr. Lin was the first vet to take a look at beloved Baloo earlier this year. The gifts of time and talent that Gigi and Margaret give to LAPS have allowed us to provide cutting edge care to animals and to make a lasting impact on our community.



FEATURE STORY: BALOO

In January of 2020, the LAPS Animal Control team received a call regarding an English Mastiff who had been abandoned in the cold for weeks. Once our officers found the dog, he was brought immediately to the safety of our shelter where a veterinarian was waiting. His legs were stiff from the cold and he was unable to walk on his own. Regardless of Baloo the suffering had endured, he never stopped wagging his tail. Although he quickly started to show improvements, we knew something was not quite right.

With the help of our veterinary partners, we searched for a diagnosis for Baloo through extensive testing. It was discovered that Baloo had a condition called Wobbler syndrome; a neurological disease common in giant breeds that affects their mobility. This diagnosis allowed us to manage his disease and match Baloo with a forever home that could provide the ongoing care he required. After spending 7 months in the care of our shelter, this gentle giant walked out the doors with his new family on August 17, 2020. Baloo touched the hearts of so many. Together, we gave him the second chance he deserved.

SERVING THE PUBLIC



LAPS employs a team of animal control officers. These specialized Bylaw Enforcement Officers are critical the protection of people and pets in our community.

Based out of the Patti Dale Animal Shelter, LAPS Animal Control Officers respond to and investigate complaints about dogs and livestock, meeting each challenge with public safety and animal welfare in mind. From assisting first responders, reuniting lost dogs with their families and herding loose cattle off busy highways, they do it all. 2020 was an exciting year for LAPS Animal Control; our proactive approach to providing excellent service to the community meant that two new Animal Control officers were added to our team.

In 2020 alone, the Animal Control team reunited over 353 lost animals with their families, responded to over 1,000 calls for service and travelled over 87,000 KMs in their vehicles. With more officers on hand, we were able to better uphold our commitment to the community. These ongoing efforts will ensure that Langley is a safe place for both humans and animals alike.
